Revised version of Subject-specific Schedule 5.4 International Economic Law (Double Degree with the University of Glasgow) to the General Assessment Regulations for Masters Programmes at Leuphana University Lüneburg Graduate School as amended on 13 July 2016

The Presidential Committee of Leuphana University Lüneburg hereby sets the following wording for Subject-specific Schedule 5.4 Major International Economic Law (Double Degree with the University of Glasgow) of 11 February 2015 (Leuphana Gazette Nr. 29/15) as amended to the General Assessment Regulations for Masters Programmes at Leuphana University Lüneburg Graduate School on 17 September 2008 (Leuphana Gazette Nr. 15/08 vom 06. Oktober 2008) and 15 June 2016 (Leuphana Gazette Nr. 33/16 of 30 June 2016)

The General Assessment Regulations for Masters Programmes at Leuphana University Lüneburg Graduate School are hereby supplemented and detailed as follows:

Section 1 of the General Assessment Regulations: Scope and terms

The elements to be taken in Lüneburg shall be governed by the General Assessment Regulations for Masters Programmes at the Graduate School and by this Subject-specific Schedule, and the elements to be taken at the University of Glasgow shall be governed by the examination regulations of the University of Glasgow. Students shall be notified of the examination regulations in Glasgow in good time through the university information system.

Section 3 of the General Assessment Regulations: Standard programme duration; course structure and scope

The standard programme duration is two years. The first year must be taken at Leuphana University Lüneburg and the second year at the University of Glasgow. The Masters dissertation is to be written at the University of Glasgow. Students shall be awarded a Masters degree once they have acquired a total of 120 credit points (CP) at Leuphana University Lüneburg and the University of Glasgow together in accordance with this Subject-specific Schedule. The modules set out for Lüneburg must be taken at Leuphana University Lüneburg and the modules set out for the University of Glasgow at the University of Glasgow. In the event that a student fails to obtain the necessary CP in Glasgow or to acquire the Master of Laws (LL.M.) of the University of Glasgow, he or she shall also have failed to complete the Masters programme at Leuphana University Lüneburg.

Section 5 of the General Assessment Regulations: Degree titles and double degrees

Master of Laws (LL.M.); award of two degrees: a Master of Laws (LL.M.) in International Economic Law from Leuphana University Lüneburg and a Master of Laws (LL.M.) from the University of Glasgow.

* 1 SCQF (Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework) is equal to a workload of 10 hours, and 1 CP to a workload of 30 hours; a module worth 30 SCQF shall therefore be recognised as a 10 CP module and the 60 SCQF Masters dissertation as a 20 CP module by Leuphana University Lüneburg

The International Economic Law double degree programme is worth a total of 120 CP including the credits to be obtained at the University of Glasgow. The curriculum comprises mandatory modules and mandatory elective modules; the requirements for each semester are set out below.

In the **first year** (60 CP), students take the following mandatory introductory modules in international economic law in Lüneburg in the first semester:

- International Law (Ma-IEL-01)
- European Law (Ma-IEL-02)
- International Private Law (Ma-IEL-03)

Each module is worth 10 CP.

In the second semester, students take the following three advanced mandatory modules in international economic law, which build on the first semester modules. The second semester is also spent in Lüneburg.

- International Economic Law (Ma-IEL-04)
- European Economic Law (Ma-IEL-05)
- European Private Law (Ma-IEL-06)

Each module is worth 10 CP.

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In the **second year** (180 SCQF/60 CP), students complete an LL.M. programme at the University of Glasgow consisting of four modules (each worth 30 SCQF/10 CP) and the Masters dissertation (60 SCQF/20 CP).

Section 6 par. 3 of the General Assessment Regulations

The programme shall be taught and examined entirely in English.

Modules and Masters dissertation in the second year of *International Economic Law* in Glasgow

The elements to be taken in the second year of the programme at the University of Glasgow shall be governed by the examination regulations of the University of Glasgow. Students shall be notified of the relevant examination regulations in good time through the university information system. The Masters dissertation is to be written at the University of Glasgow in accordance with the examination regulations of the University of Glasgow. The first reviewer shall be an examiner from the University of Glasgow and the second reviewer an examiner from Leuphana University.

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Entry into force

This Subject-specific Schedule shall enter into force following approval by the Presidential Committee of Leuphana University Lüneburg following its publication in the Leuphana University Lüneburg Gazette with effect from the 2016/2017 winter semester.

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
