#### **Comment:**

Gatekeepers can promote or prevent one's success and connections play the biggest roll in this spiderweb of the art world.

Generally art can be split up into three categories: fine arts, performing arts and music. In non conventional art styles within these categories it is especially difficult to find support or further education, so creating positions of mentors or help centers is essential to help young artists kickstart their careers. Creative minds that did not have a lot off access to art growing up or lived in places without a strong artistic infrastructure have difficulties to find connections into the art world and therefore struggle to find their audience.

Even though this seems like a complex problem it can be fixed or prevented by some simple actions. Jobs and institutions have to be promoted to which newcomers can turn for support. Especially the role of gatekeepers has to be completely redefined. Their field of work has to expand into new topics and alternative styles whilst the power that they hold needs to be divided to a larger number of gatekeepers. Newer gatekeepers have to be willing to open up the art world for new talents and ideas. Moreover they should collectively open up more institutions to support, share their knowledge and create room to showcase daring, brave art.

In conclusion it is a fact that gaining popularity with non conventional art is challenging because the access to the art world is so heavily regulated. Creating a support system becomes non negotiable to open the gates of the art world for groundbreaking talents.
