FOR WHOM THE WORLD CHANGES - HOW ACTIVISTS CONSTRUCT MEANINGFUL TURNING POINTS

This comment will focus on turning points in activism and to which extent they are visible to society as a whole.

Another very possible reason for turning points, or any form of activism to go unnoticed for that matter, plainly is that many people may just not be affected by it. Most people go through their day with some degree of ignorance towards others and as a result of this some events – no matter the severity – just go unnoticed or dismissed by the masses. We see this especially with conflicts in the middle east and political suppression in third world countries. Conflicts that warrant any sort of activism like these often go unnoticed themselves, so the events following them often receive the same treatment.

Conclusively, most turning points in activism still struggle to find real traction and attention from the public with many movements just being overlooked or utterly dismissed. This is something we all should aim to change and ultimately let this be a lesson to try and seek to be more aware of everyone's struggles and not just your own.
