Notes on preparation

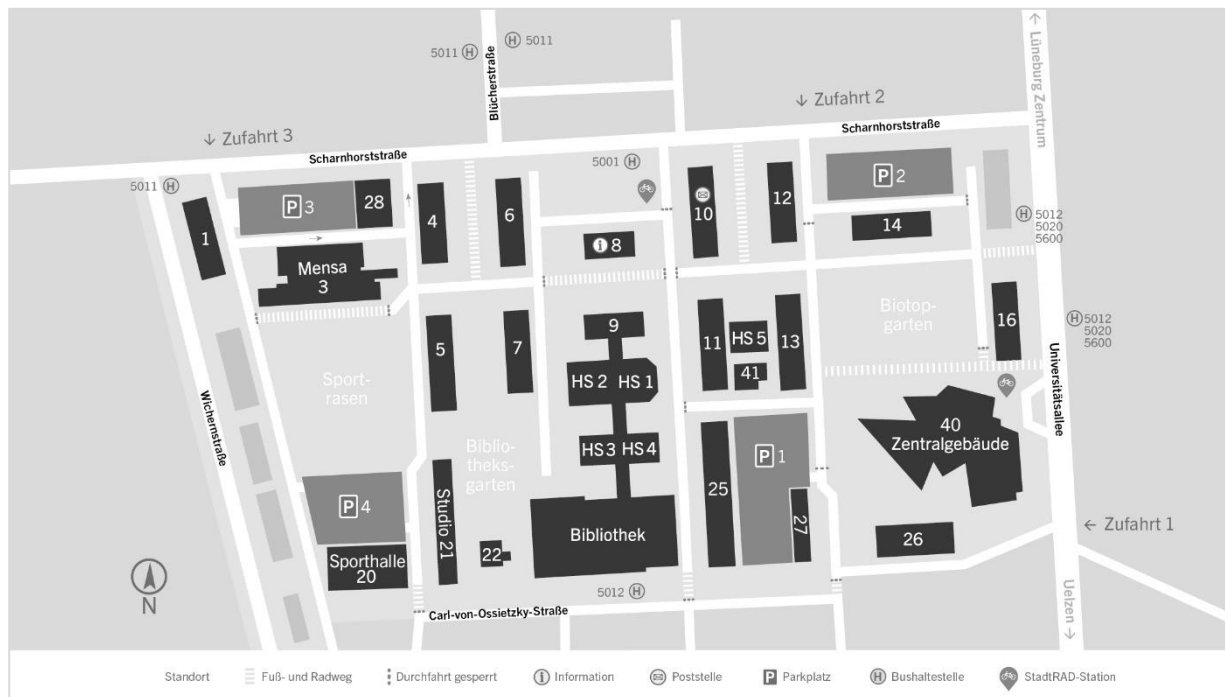
During the taster study, you have the opportunity to take part in regular bachelor's courses as a guest. We have selected courses from various subject areas for you, which you can find on the following pages.

Courses are subject to change at short notice. That means, if a teacher falls ill, we cannot inform you about the cancellation of the course. If you plan to attend courses multiple times, we recommend contacting other students in order to stay informed about possible changes at short notice. Long-term planned changes (such as room changes etc.) are listed in the *remarks* section.

The courses usually take place weekly. Exceptions are listed in the *remarks* section.

As a visitor to the taster study, you do not need to register for the events. **Please go to the lecturer before the event and inform them about your participation.**

The events all take place on the Central Campus: C = Campus, Universitätsallee 1

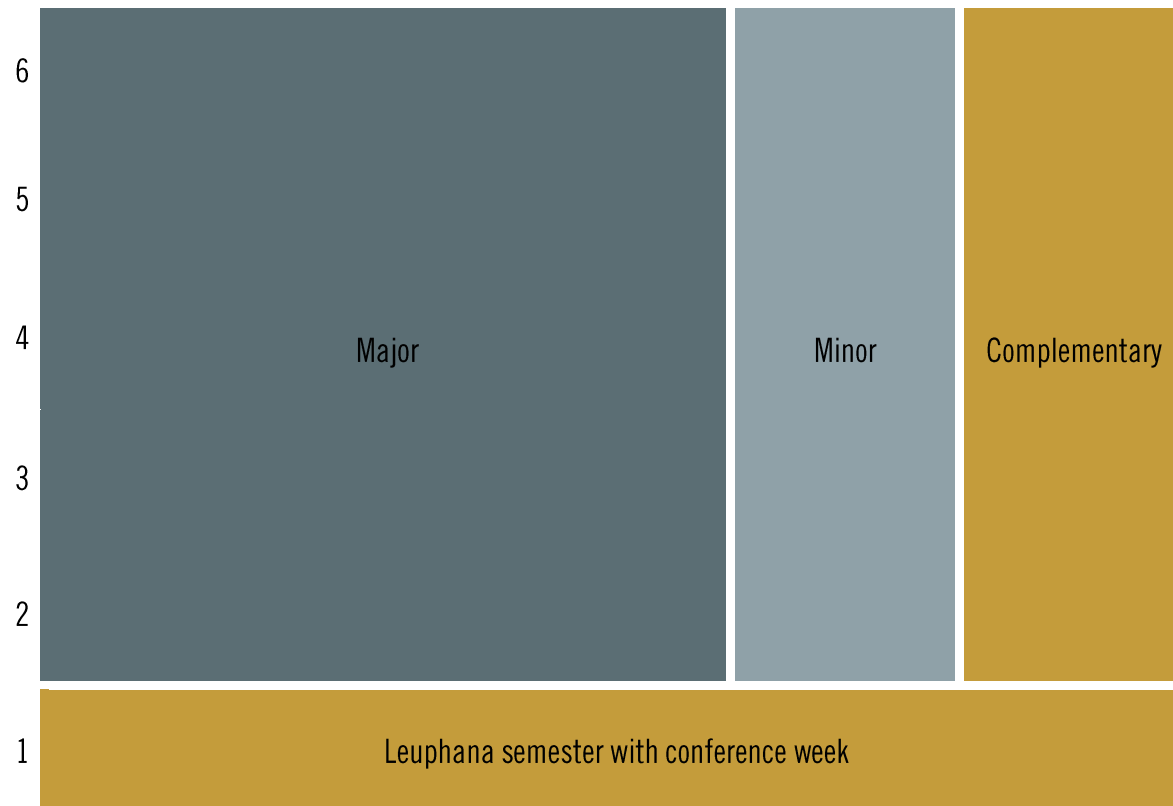
The parking area P2 next to building 12 and 14 is closed.

Leuphana Bachelor

The Leuphana bachelor's program consists of four parts: Leuphana Semester, Major, Minor and Complementary Studies. When applying for a study program, you choose a major and a minor.

You choose the content of the Leuphana semester and the complementary studies by selecting the course in the respective semester.

The Leuphana semester only takes place in the winter semester. The courses from the complementary study program are not open for the taster study.

Definitions

Lecture

Course at a university which - in the form of frontal teaching - serves to impart specific knowledge. In the past, professors actually read aloud (e.g. from textbooks). Today, there is largely a different understanding of how teaching can be designed in a didactically meaningful way (even if some people still prefer to limit themselves to just reading aloud). Free speech is now predominantly preferred. Media are also increasingly being used. Attempts are sometimes made to involve students, but in large lectures with several hundred students this is rather tedious for everyone involved.

Exercise

Many lectures are accompanied by exercises or other events in order to practice and apply what has been learned in smaller groups.

Seminar

Course in which certain topics are dealt with and discussed in depth. In most cases, participants are expected to participate actively, write assignments and give presentations. Ideally, the groups should comprise no more than 20-30 students.
