Arena: Risks and potentials of trade agreements at the example of the EU-Mercosur agreement

Description: In the last couple of years, we saw thousands of people going on the street to prevent trade agreements like TTIP or CETA to be put into practice. Why did so many people protest against these trade agreements in the first place? And what motivated the people who originally tried to put them into place? What are the real risks and potentials of these trade agreements? At the moment, the EU and the Mercosur region (a group of Latin American states) are in negotiations about a new trade agreement. On the one hand, advocates of the agreement consider it to be a chance for the EU to have a positive impact on the region and its respective political decisions. Critics, however, mention not only negative environmental consequences due to deforestation and higher exports of cheap meat or soy, but also potential dangers to local economies and their value chains. Political scientist and Latin America expert Prof. Dr. Detlef Nolte will give a short introductory keynote on the topic of the currently discussed EU-Mercosur trade agreement and explain his position supporting the agreement, followed by a dialogue with the audience. Both supporters and opponents of trade agreements in general or the EU-Mercosur agreement in particular are encouraged to join the debate.
